Magnolia Room is at Pelican Preserve Town Center. From Daniels Rd. and Cleveland (US 41) go east on Daniels Rd. past I-75 to the light at Treeline Ave., about 5 miles. Left on Treeline Ave. Follow Treeline Ave. for about 4.3 miles. Right onto Pelican Preserve Blvd., entering the community. Right at 2nd intersection on to Veneto Dr. (opposite the Club at Pelican Preserve). Magnolia Room is at Pelican Preserve Town Center.
